Résumé: Air pollution and road traffic noise are considered to be the two most important nuisances that could negatively affect the quality of life. A prolonged exposure to high concentrations of these pollutants could conduct to various health problems. Studies in environmental equity have often considered these nuisances individually whenever it comes from the same source. The main objective of this paper is to determine if the 15 years of age, those aged 65 and over, visible minorities and low income individuals located in a portion of the Island of Montreal are overrepresented in city blocks characterized by having among the highest levels of transportation-related air pollutants (i.e., ambient concentrations of NO₂ and road traffic noise in decibels (dB(A))). The results show that low-income individuals and, to a lesser extent, visible minorities, are significantly overrepresented in city blocks characterized by the higher levels of NO₂ and road traffic noise in dB(A). Multinomial logistic regression analysis confirms these results, and also shows that young people under 15 years are under-represented in the most polluted areas. However, contrary to the previous bivariate results, people aged 65 and over are negatively and significantly associated with the likelihood of their living in a city block located in an advantaged area after controlling for the independent effects of the other explanatory variables. Moreover, visible minorities are significantly overrepresented in advantaged areas. Considering the observed results, some solutions are identified to reduce road traffic noise and air pollution in the city blocks localized near major traffic arteries.

Résumé: This article aims to examine participation and influence of pensioners' organizations in a context of marketization within local elderly care. The literature on New Public Management (NPM) points out different views on the effects of marketization on the participation of organized interests within the decision-making process. One view states marketization implies less of participation by organized interests since this stands in conflict with inherent values of NPM, such as efficiency and the citizen as customer on a market. An opposite view states that marketization does not cause this effect, i.e., organized interests participate in the same manner as before. The empirical investigation consists of interviews and official documents from four Swedish municipalities with a marketized elderly care. The result is that marketization does not cause any major crowding out effect on organized interests from the decision-making process. However, concerns can be raised about the extent and quality of participation since procedures of contracting out are not always compatible with democratic values such as transparency and participation.

Résumé: (Abstract from the publisher) Fear of falling and other fall-related psychological concerns (FRPCs), such as falls-efficacy and balance confidence, are highly prevalent among community-dwelling older adults. Anxiety and FRPCs have frequently, but inconsistently, been found to be associated in the literature. The purpose of this study is to clarify those inconsistencies with a systematic review and meta-analysis and to evaluate if the strength of this relationship varies based on the different FRPC constructs used (e.g., fear of falling, falls-efficacy or balance confidence). A systematic review was conducted through multiple databases (e.g., MEDLINE, PsycINFO) to include all articles published before June 10th 2015 that measured anxiety and FRPCs in community-dwelling older adults. Active researchers in the field were also contacted in an effort to include unpublished studies. The systematic review led to the inclusion of twenty relevant articles (n = 4738). A random-effect meta-analysis revealed that the mean effect size for fear of falling and anxiety is $r = 0.32$ (95% CI: 0.22-0.40), $Z = 6.49$, $p < 0.001$ and the mean effect size for falls-efficacy or balance confidence and anxiety is $r = 0.31$ (95% CI: 0.23-0.40), $Z = 6.72$, $p < 0.001$. A Q-test for heterogeneity revealed that the two effect sizes are not significantly different ($Q(19) = 0.13$, $p = n.s.$). This study is the first meta-analysis on the relationship between anxiety and FRPCs among community-dwelling older adults. It demonstrates the importance of considering anxiety when treating older adults with FRPCs.

Résumé: (Abstract from the publisher) Leisure plays an important role in family relations, yet family leisure scholars have paid scant attention to the experiences of grandparents in the family system. The purpose of the current study is to explore the meaning of family leisure for grandparents who have adult grandchildren. Using an inductive, qualitative approach, semi-structured interviews were conducted with 30 Canadian grandparents who had adult grandchildren. Findings are discussed in relation to two key themes that illustrate the purposive nature of family leisure for grandparents, including: a) centrality of family leisure in developing family ties, and b) family leisure as a means for the transmission of family values.

Résumé: (Abstract from the publisher) Homelessness among older people is expected to rise as a result of unmet need and demographic change. Yet, strategies and responses to homelessness across Canada tend to focus on younger groups, overlooking the circumstances and needs of older people (i.e., age 50+). This article reports the results of a content analysis of government planning documents on homelessness conducted in 2014. A total of 42 local, provincial, and federal strategies were reviewed to assess the extent to which they recognized and targeted the needs of older people. Our review resulted in three categories of documents: 1) documents with no discussion of homelessness among older people (n=16; 38%); 2) documents with a minimal discussion of homelessness among older people (n=22; 55%); and 3) documents with a significant discussion of homelessness among older people (n=4; 7%).

Results indicate that while many strategies are beginning to consider older people as a subgroup with unique needs, little action has been taken to develop comprehensive services and supports for this group. We conclude with a call to integrate the needs of diverse groups of older people into strategies to end homelessness and to develop programs and responses that are suitable for older people.

Résumé: (Abstract from the publisher) Population aging and longevity due to medical advances over the past few decades have meant that the approximately 44 million caregivers in the United States and eight million caregivers in Canada must provide more intensive levels of care and for longer periods of time. Consequently, caregivers are often profoundly affected by their caregiving role in emotional, psychological, physical, and financial ways. Thirty years of research on this population have helped to create a caregiver profile and identify the significant challenges for caregivers. One area explored to a much lesser extent is the postcaregiving period, when the caregiver transitions into a period of bereavement. This period can be particularly challenging for caregivers given the commitment inherent in the caregiving process. Research has shown that the emotional reactions of caregivers as well as practical challenges do not end with the death of the care recipient. In fact, complex realities, tensions, and responses continue well after the death into the postcaregiving period. This study of bereaved women caregivers explored their lived experiences in the postcaregiving phase. One central theme emerged and suggested that the experience of caregiving had an effect on the caregivers’ identities, which then influenced their bereavement processes and experiences.

Résumé: (Abstract from the publisher) There are many studies that have examined the meaning of home for older people. In this article, our aim is to add the concept of ‘liminal homes’ to the existing discussion: While the concept of liminal homes can be applied to a number of ‘interim spaces’, we focus in our study, on those older people who have to consider, or are concretely confronted with, the need to move into another living space, because of declining health. Based on interviews and photo-elicitation with 26 older lower-income seniors living in Montreal, Québec, this article demonstrates the complexity of liminality and analyzes the dynamics of this process, composed of a web of interrelated and often dichotomous elements. These include the idealized home in contrast to (sometimes imagined) institutions; declining health as opposed to the ideals of active aging and third age; and the widely promoted concept of aging in place versus the reality of being ‘stuck in place’ due to limited resources. The strategies employed by these older Quebecers to remain in this state and resist a move to another living space, are the often arduous construction of a ‘patchwork of care’.

Résumé: (Abstract from the publisher) Background Social participation, a determinant of health in older adults, requires innovative interventions. The personalised citizen assistance for social participation (APIC) involves weekly three-hour personalised stimulation sessions targeting significant social and leisure activities difficult to accomplish. Recently adapted for older adults, the APIC’s impact on this population is unknown. Objective This study explored the impact of APIC on older adults with disabilities. Methods A mixed-method design including a pre-experimental component was used with 16 participants (11 women) aged 66–91 (79.4 ± 8.7) with disabilities, living at home. They completed functional autonomy, social participation, leisure and quality of life questionnaires, and semi-structured interviews. Results APIC increased older adults’ functional autonomy (p = 0.02), accomplishment (p < 0.01) and satisfaction (p = 0.02) with social participation, and frequency of leisure practice (p < 0.01). Post-intervention, participants wished to modify the practice (p < 0.01) and frequency (p < 0.01) of leisure activities, and difficulties in their social environment diminished (p = 0.03). Their attitude toward leisure (p = 0.04) as well as their health (p < 0.01) and psychological (p = 0.03) quality of life improved. Older adults thought APIC helped them resume, maintain, explore and experiment with significant social activities. It also increased their psychological and physical well-being, feeling of control, connectedness, self-esteem and motivation to accomplish activities. Finally, APIC can compensate for an unavailable and crumbling social network. Conclusion APIC is a promising intervention that leads to new opportunities for older adults to increase community integration and enhance the social component of their lives. It can also optimise how the needs of older adults are met, including utilisation of personal and environmental resources.

Résumé: (Abstract from the publisher) Canada is expecting rapid population aging over the coming decades, a fact that has led many observers to question the sustainability of its pension systems. The effects of population aging, however, could be mitigated by an extension of the working life. This article presents the results of a critical review of Canadian knowledge about the determinants of retirement age and labour-market participation of older workers. The determinants are grouped under ten “domains” covering micro, meso, and macro levels: labour market, legislation, financial factors, social position, domestic domain, human resource management, work-related factors, health, work ability, and motivation.

Résumé: (provenant du site de Statistique Canada) Cet article présente une analyse de l'impact de l'immigration sur la taille et la composition ethnoculturelle des futures cohortes de personnes âgées au Canada, au moyen des données tirées du Programme des estimations démographiques, du Programme des projections démographiques et d'autres sources de données démographiques.

- Parmi les personnes nées entre 1937 à 1941 au Canada, 19 % n'ont pas survécu jusqu'à l'âge de 65 ans. Parmi celles nées entre 1997 et 2011, le pourcentage de décès à l'âge de 65 ans pourrait être d'environ 6 % en raison de gains sur le plan de l'espérance de vie.

Pratiques de pointe / Leading Practices

Maltraitance des personnes âgées, âgisme / Mistreatment of Older Adults, Ageism
